Rector's Note

At the end of this first year of the 21st century all will have their own thoughts. None of us will forget this year, the vivid horror of September 11th and the international human tragedy that followed. Three months on we are realising that a fundamental change has taken place, that fear and doubt now threaten trust and confidence at a global level. A big task for us all, teachers, parents and pupils, is to ensure that we do not become inward-looking, cautious or negative. It is worth remembering that 70 years ago, at the very depth of the Great Depression in the USA, when the stock market had crashed and the productive industry of the strongest country in the world had collapsed, President Roosevelt went on the radio to say that "the only thing we have to fear is fear itself".

So when the traditional Christmas songs tell us to be of good cheer we should take particular note this year.

One good consequence of the evil and misery we have just seen may be that the conscience of our society is awakened, that politics becomes seen as a necessary way of changing or improving our community, that concern for others in worse conditions than ourselves is heightened. Perhaps the citizens of today's Madras and tomorrow's Scotland will have a fuller understanding of our global village and the interweaving of politics with religion, wealth and power. Perhaps the strength of Amnesty work in both junior and senior buildings is a positive indication.

The pages which follow will map out some of the landmarks in a busy term. One interesting perspective on current concerns and activities has recently been provided by a collection of letters written by a former pupil, Joseph Hargraves between 1847 and 1854. Miss Rust who has just retired after 14 years assisting in the Office and the school Archive came across this collection in


the National Archives of Scotland. Below you can see a photograph of Joseph and some examples of his work in those days. We think that the photograph must be one of the very earliest taken of a school pupil anywhere and we know that St Andrews was a centre of early photography. Joseph's letters are mostly about people he knows, about successes and disappointments in classwork, about his free time, and about the plans for seeing his family and friends. He was a boarder in Mr Young's house (possibly the present Music House).

We are given an insight into a life of seeming simplicity, orderliness, a sense of the rightness of things and trust in the structures of society. Even so it was far from inward-looking as the letters cover contacts in the East Indies, Hudson's Bay and London. There was a global village of sorts even then, courtesy of the British Empire. Joseph's delight at the present of buffalo tongues and cranberries say it all.


Joseph's letters describe his feelings about everything he sees and does, heightened perhaps by the unnatural life

away from his family, but still making the best of a unique experience in what his mother (writing from London in 1847) describes as "one of the best seminaries for children which our country contains". Not bad for a school only founded 14 years previously.

We shall be making a small publication of this interesting correspondence. Meantime let us resolve that 150 years on someone somewhere will be able to learn about good things happening in our times at Madras.

A range of senior classes had the privilege of welcoming Kate Clanchy, who read some of her work, and was able to answer at least some of the questions which arise from these all-too-brief sessions. Both visitors spoke highly of the pupils, and very much enjoyed their visits.

With each passing year Stanza enhances its reputation, and is rapidly establishing itself as one of the major venues where established authors can rub shoulders with those who are relatively new to the craft. The committee has announced its intention of broadening its links with the school, and next session's poetry week should be very exciting - watch this space!

Tales from Abroad

Great Valley High School, Pennsylvania, USA Exchange. Ashley Greenhow has just returned home to the USA having spent 4 months attending Madras and living with a host family in St Andrews. By all accounts she has had a great time in Scotland and her "family" have thoroughly enjoyed her company. Her host and exchange partner, Sian Inch (S6), will travel to America at the end of January, spending a similar length of time attending Great Valley. Sian is really looking forward to staying with the Greenhows and experiencing an American way of life. Recruitment for the 2002-03 exchange which is open to all S5 pupils, will take place after the prelims, in February.

Fourth, fifth and sixth year pupils took part in a very successful visit to Loches (St Andrews' partner town) during the first week of the October holiday. Useful contacts were made with the local school, the Lycee Alfred de Vigny, and we hope to follow these up with some form of exchange visit. During the week, our pupils spent two days in school and sampled, apart from classes in several subjects, the excellent food in the school canteen. Visits were made to the surrounding area and a day was spent at the science-based theme park, Futuroscope. Loches itself is now very familiar!

The School and Its Community

An Anti-Littering Initiative has been in operation this term to try to reduce the amount of litter dropped in and around the Kilrymont Road building. A committee of staff and pupils has been set up to look at the problem of littering. Miss Stewart of the Art department and S3 pupils have been busy creating posters to draw pupils' attention to what we can do to reduce litter; the janitors in liaison with Mr Latona of the Computing department and another group of S3 pupils have been regularly informing us in graphical form of how much litter is being put in the new bins and how much is still being dropped. The statistics make interesting reading. To date, certain areas of the building are looking better but others still need attention. We shall introduce a pupil reward system if we can keep litter to an acceptably low level into February. It is here that we would appreciate your help in supporting us in our campaign to reduce litter by discussing the matter with your children.

A Road Safety Programme was presented to S1 and S6 pupils by the Baldie Bain Theatre Company last term. This focussed on road safety issues and driving respectively. The performing group was very well received and was very complimentary about the pupil response to them.

Due to the variety of fundraising over the last few sessions, a Charities Committee, composed of staff and pupils from S3 and S6 has been formed. The

main event so far has been the "The Mad(ras) Hatters Day" which raised £1,000 for the BBC Children In Need Appeal. Pupils and staff in assorted headgear presented their cheque at the Byre Theatre on the day of the appeal. The photograph in the local press gave an indication of the enjoyment there was in being involved in such a worthy cause. Cancer First Aid will receive nearly £400 by Christmas and other charities who have been supported since the beginning of the session are The Scottish Poppy Appeal, Arthritis Research Campaign, AIDS Awareness Fife and The Red Cross.

All S3 pupils have recently undergone training in Heartstart during their Social Education classes. This has been kindly given by Dr H Tait and his team of helpers. Twin-site co-operation also took place with S6 pupils ably assisting the younger pupils to learn this vital skill.

Focus on Art

This year's St Andrews Week celebrations involved Madras pupils in a number of artistic events.

At the start of the week land artist Jim Buchanan worked with S3 and S6 pupils. Jim explained his work to the pupils which centres around his interest in labyrinths and their role in cultures around the world. The pupils were able to walk around one of Jim's labyrinths, based on the labyrinth in Chartres Cathedral in France.

The S6 pupils were particularly interested in the fact that instead of drawing with a piece of charcoal like most artists, Jim uses a rotavator! (Substitute field outside Fort Augustus for the normal sheet of cartridge paper.)

Jim then went on to install his "light-labyrinth" in the grounds of St Andrews Cathedral as one of the main events of the celebrations.

Madras pupils also had art work and photography on display in the fourth annual St Andrews Week Exhibition in the Memorial Hall.

The exhibition is in two parts. The first focuses on traditional artwork including oil-painting, watercolour work, printmaking and drawing by adults and children. Awards and certificates for the work were presented by Ruth Walker, a well-known local artist. The award for the best artwork in the junior section went to Krystin Ingram (S4) for her superb self-portrait. Arran Howie (S3) was highly commended for her painting.

The second part of the exhibition features photography with prizes for chosen work donated by Boots the chemist. All 4 junior prizes were taken by Madras pupils. In the St Andrews theme first prize went to Katie Kendrick (S6) and Andrew Aiton (S4) was highly commended.

In the open theme, first prize went to Brenna O'Rourke (S6), and Ellen Mason (S6) was highly commended.

The winning photographs will be on display in Boots in the new year.

Barcelona 2001

Yes, once again the Art and Design department decided to leave the Fife high life behind and head for the sunnier climes of Barcelona. A myriad of visual encounters awaited the pupils in the Catalonian capital with sweeping boulevards, extravagant Gaudi architecture and the meandering and colourful streets of Barcelona's old quarter. There were a few surprises as well, including accomplished oil paintings so realistic you could almost here the figures breathe! These were not by an old master, of course, but by the 14-year-old Picasso. There were more questions than answers at the bizarre and theatrical Salvador Dali Museum in Figueras. Even more challenges to mainstream perception were encountered at the Miro Foundation, housing mystical and whimsical giant canvases. But it was the city itself which took centre stage with a cacophonous medley of traffic, tourists and street musicians. Some tested their vertigo to the limit and climbed the spires of the Segrada Familia. Others took in the ambience of Barcelona street life both in photography and drawing, enjoying respite from the crowds in a church cloister protected by geese! Staff were impressed by the quality and quantity of sketching by pupils who appeared to relish the vibrant atmosphere of this Mediterranean port as well as the unusually hot weather. The pupils' recollections will no doubt vary, whether it be relaxing in Gaudi's Park Guell, watching Rivaldo in training, the hair-pin bends on the road to Dali's house in Cadaques or the ladies rest-room facilities on our first overnight stop through France!

Soapbox Speechmaking Competition

For the first time the school entered a Soapbox Speechmaking Competition, sponsored by Edinburgh Solicitors Property Centre, Central FM and The Stirling Observer. The competition is open to pupils from Falkirk, Stirling, Clackmannanshire and Fife. The emphasis is undoubtedly on fun! The Madras team of Julia Higgins (S6) as Chairman and Thomas Foster (S5) as Speaker won the Fife round, with Thomas talking on the topic, "I'm Not Uniform". In the final, held in Stirling Castle, the team argued against the idea that everyone should be forced to attend the University of Disney. To the delight of parents, staff and pupils who accompanied the duo to the final, Julia and Thomas were placed first in a unanimous decision by the judges. Prizes included a glass trophy, £100 for

Subjectively Speaking

Shona Leenhoots, Sarah Dunn (S3), Heather Barnes and Toby Gilbertson are through to the semi-final of the Chemistry Top of the Bench Competition after a fine win against Kirkcaldy High School.

In the Enterprising Mathematics Competition the team of Ian Brodie, Natalie Jackson (both S4) and Sarah Dunn, Jillian Sneddon (both S3) won the Fife round before going on to achieve 10th place out of 32 teams in the Scottish contest. The whole day event (the final was held in Northern College, Dundee) was a very intense, tiring but fun time for the pupils who also came 3rd in the poster competition.

The UK Senior Mathematical Challenge is an annual Maths contest run by the UK Mathematics Trust. This year there were 53,810 entries from over 1,360 schools from all parts of the UK. The contest was held on Tuesday 6th November with 70 of our pupils participating. Awards are set nationally. This year the top 6% gained Gold, a further 14% gained Silver and 20% gained Bronze. Our results were quite exceptional this year with 4 Gold, 11 Silver and 17 Bronze awards. Three of our candidates achieved sufficiently high scores that they qualified for the prestigious British Maths Olympiad. This was held on Wednesday 5th December. They were David Stephens (S6), Joe Neilson (S5) and Dorothy Winn (S5).

The Drama department have been extremely busy this session. The fourth years have been giving lunchtime performances of dance routines created by themselves. In fifth and sixth year Intermediate 2 and Higher pupils have presented productions for parents and friends as have the Advanced Higher group. Pupils from S4 took centre stage for the PTA evening on "Teenage Trials and Triumphs". There were theatre visits to "The Seagull" at Dundee Rep, "The Messiah" at the Theatre Royal in Glasgow and "The Bondagers" at the Byre. However, the showpiece so far has been the performances of "Midsummer Night's Dream" directed by Miss Dewar. Despite the cold weather, the school's Quad Theatre played host to capacity


audiences for this production of Shakespeare's enduringly popular comedy. It may have been chilly and miserable outside, but the moment the actors took the stage, a warm magic began to assert itself. All parts were magnificently played with Oberon's Puck full of athleticism and verve and Titania's troupe of fairies energetic and delightful. The Mechanicals' performance of *Pyramus* and *Thisbe* had the audiences rolling in the aisles. The warm applause was well deserved. Well done to producer Miss Dewar and her assistants. We went out into a dreich and dark St Andrews night, but somehow the weather didn't matter any more: the spirit of midsummer was with us all.

DEBATING

The varied forms of Debating at Kilrymont Road are well to the fore this session. The full programme has included Instant Debates, an excellent Balloon Debate with Christopher Columbus steering the balloon to safety. "Hippies versus Yuppies", "Animal Testing" and "Whether Santa Is A Fat Cat Or Not" provided food for thought and loads of entertainment. On the competition front Claire Field and Lindsey Forbes, both S1, put up an excellent performance in the Courier Debate, narrowly missing going through to Round 2. Michelle Thaddeus and Anna Wovk in third year progressed to Round 2 of both the Courier and English Speaking Competitions.

Upper Arlington Exchange 2001-02

A group of 5 Madras College Sixth Formers chaperoned by Mr and Mrs Bennett travelled to the birthplace of Jack Nicklaus during their October vacation. This is part of a cultural link between the two communities and the second time senior pupils and staff have benefited from living with families in very different settings and education systems.

"11th September 2001" was predominant in all conversations. The Americans were pleased the Scots had come and this was especially shown by the turnout at the Student Exchange Dinner celebrating the event. After the American students had made statements about their visit to St Andrews, Adam Young described what the Madras pupils gained from their American experience. "Key to the City" pins were awarded to pupils Jennifer Duck, Laura Gilman, Jennifer Gilruth, Christopher Seenan and Adam Young and to the chaperones.

Play up, Play up

S1 rugby had an excellent start to the season, having played 10 Saturday games and won all, averaging 9 tries per game and playing extremely attractive rugby. There is tremendous competition for places as over 30 players per week attend practices. The team were runners-up in the Midlands Tournament and will go forward to the National Finals next term. Ninety pupils and 10 staff successfully negotiated 3 return trips in 3 weeks to Murrayfield to watch Scotland play Tonga, Argentina and New Zealand.

First Year football has been equally popular with the school able to field 3 7-a-side teams on occasion. To date the teams have won 33, lost 7 and drawn 8.

Remarkably, the senior footballers won the Fife Schools' 5-a-sides for the sixth consecutive year, defeating Woodmill High School 2-0 in the semi-final and Queen Anne High School 5-1 in the final. This has never been achieved before by any Fife school. The Under 14s were narrowly defeated by Kirkcaldy High School 1-0 in their final.

This year has seen the biggest turn-out of runners at lunchtimes. Up to 23 pupils have regularly attended. In the Fife Schools' Road Relay Championships the First Year Boys' Team (Frankie Scott, Craig Moir and Keith Simpson) came first winning the shield and gold medals, with Frankie Scott winning the individual lap gold medal. The Girls' Over 15 team (Joanna Wilson (S3), Hannah Bredin (S4) and Alison Rowe (S5) also came first to win gold medals. The Under 15 Girls, all second year, came second as did the Over 15 Boys, all fourth year. In the Scottish Championships the S1 Boys team came fourth and the Medley Girls team came seventh.

The girls' hockey teams - first, second and third year and seniors - have had a full fixture card since September with very few matches being cancelled because of the weather. Although they have had mixed results, the girls' enthusiasm has never faltered. The senior girls' squad won the Fife Schools' Tournament and have qualified for the Scottish Indoor Finals by coming second in the Midlands Tournament. We wish them good luck for the tourney in January. Individually, Alison Bell (S6) has been

selected for the Midlands and Scottish Under 18 training squads: Helena Bateman (S4) for the Midlands Under 16 and Samantha Sangster (S4) for the Midlands and Scottish Under 16 squads.

In swimming the school has never fared better in the Fife Schools' Championships winning the cup for the Best Secondary School: David Taylor (S5) was first in the Breaststroke and in team events Keith Simpson, David Littlejohn, Jonathan Watters and Stuart Fitzpatrick were first in the 12/13 Freestyle Relay while Andrew Littlejohn, Sanjee Jayasekera, Steven Paul and John Fraser took the honours in the 14/15 Freestyle Relay. This was an all-round magnificent achievement.

Congratulations go to Steven Birrell (S1), Julie Brown (S2) and Michelle Thaddeus (S3) who have been selected for the Junior Fife Schools' Badminton team to compete in inter-area competitions and to Tim Weir (S3) for being selected for the intermediate age group.

Chris McCall (S1) has been representing the school in the Scottish Schools' Fencing Championships coming fifth in the Foil and seventh in the Epee. He has twice qualified for the Under 14 group at the British Championships, gaining third in the Under 13 Leon Pauls event.

The Quad Fund

The Quad Fund Committee is pleased to report that the fund now stands at over £29,000. The first phase of work on the columns to the north side of the quadrangle is nearly completed. Parents are welcome to inspect what has been done at any time. Mr Watson the stonemason hopes to start the west side of the quad in the new year.
