## Rector's Note

It is always interesting to look back over a term and to take pleasure in the many successes we have enjoyed. Like me, I am sure you will be impressed by the wide range of articles reported in this newsletter. In a recent school review this aspect of Madras College was recognised as a strength by all who were consulted. I am very grateful to all members of staff who volunteer to run these clubs and activities.

Our recently reintroduced prefect system is bedding down and we have an impressive number of applications for the post next session, when we intend to develop this further. The consultation over uniform is now complete and we are in the process of evaluating the data. My thanks to all who responded to the survey.

Senior pupils are about to sit important SQA examinations. In the period up to the examinations it is vital to strike the correct balance between continuing work, revision and leisure. Advice on this is available from the Guidance Team.

Developments on the New Madras are moving ahead with the Business Plan being presented to the Education and Children's Services Committee on 8th April. Assuming the report is accepted we will enter into a consultation phase early next term.

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### School Meal Charges

As from Thursday 1st April 2010 a secondary school meal will cost **£1.65** per day. Adult meals will cost **£2.60**.

Over and above the cost of a school meal, milk cartons will be charged at **16 p** per carton.

## Purple Pinkie

### South Street and Kilrymont Road

**P**urple Pinkie Week is a nationwide week of fundraising in a last big attempt to eradicate Polio across the world once and for all. Polio has no cure. It is a crippling and potentially fatal disease and children under the age of five are at greatest risk. A vaccine has been created, but in countries of extreme poverty with remote areas it is hard for organisations to access everybody. It takes a huge effort from the charity to manufacture the vaccine, transport it to remote areas and promote the vaccination days. This is one of the world's biggest immunisation programmes and as Polio is 99% eradicated it has already been a huge success.

In April of 2008, 72.9 million children were given the Polio vaccine and over the years more than two billion children have been protected from the disease. Without the vaccine, five million children would have been disabled by the disease and 250,000 children killed. Now, only 1,173 new cases of Polio were reported and in just four countries: Afghanistan, India, Pakistan and Nigeria. Polio is easy to prevent by a vaccination that costs just 50p. When a child is vaccinated, they have a purple stamp put on their little finger – giving them a Purple Pinkie.

Wednesday 24th February saw one of the biggest Bake Sales at Kilrymont Road. Pupils from Home Economics classes, from the 3rd year Prince's Trust Group and from the Charities Committee

joined with some of the staff to sell over 500 cakes at morning break. After 10 minutes there was not a crumb to be seen!! This event raised over £160.

On Friday the 26th of February, Madras College was considerably more purple than the average school day. Pupils from both buildings wore any purple item of clothing they could get their hands on (resulting in some very unique outfits!) all for the sake of charity, in aid of Purple Pinkie day.

At break time, a bake sale was organised at South Street selling an array of cakes and biscuits and drinks, most with a purple/pink theme! But the main event of the day was the Open Mic concert at lunchtime. Living up to its name, there was no set list but the organisers knew we could depend on the wealth of talent in Madras to produce a great show. The Assembly Hall filled up quickly in a sea of purple and pupils went round with buckets collecting donations. We were entertained by rock bands, singers and even a little rapping! A big thank you to all those who sang and played, including, Jamie Harris, David Robertson, Adam Fleming, Adam Marshall, Frazer Stockton, Mike Payne, Liam Vincent-Kilbride, Mr Payton, William Johnston, Kirsty Liggat, Miriam Martindale-Malek, Alice Herrington, Jamie Murphy, Jimmy Wright, Ben Horban, and the host of the event, Luke Driscoll. All the performances were of such a high standard and in good humour and spirit. The bands played seamlessly and the singers wowed the audience with their brilliant vocals. It was definitely an event the school can be proud of and the effort that went into organising all of the events on the day was fantastic.

At the end of the day, £1,700 was raised by the whole school. Considering that £1 can save 2 children from Polio, this is a brilliant contribution and one of the highest totals raised by Madras College.

Many thanks go to the organisers of events, helpers, pupils, staff and parents for making this whole school event so successful.



## Pi Memorisation Event !!!!!!!!

# ECO CLUB

A group of pupils from Madras College's Eco Committee and Department of Additional Support treated Councillors to a brief rundown of the work they have been involved in over the last two years. In a specially arranged presentation they were able to tell the members of the Education and Children's Services Committee at Fife House of their achievements to date.

Madras College is one of only a small number of secondary schools in Scotland to have received a green Eco-Schools flag. A massive amount of work has gone into trying to create an ecological ethos at the school. This includes creating two new gardens, an outdoor classroom, planters in the South Street quad, the flower display at Hope Park church, a sponsored walk for Water Aid, all their paper recycling, litter control and the Fair Trade tuck shop.

James Primmer, a second year pupil and chair of the Eco-Committee, said: "We are especially proud of our new gardens. Each garden was designed so that it can be transported to another location when we get our new school. We have worked with teachers from all departments and landscape designers with brilliant results. One of the gardens, which was previously a disused drying green, is right next to the Home Economics department so they can now access fresh herbs, vegetables and even fruit." Robert Carrick (S3) added that they had also revamped a secret garden in South Street too and given it a new lease of life.

Councillors heard how the school is hopeful of receiving a second green flag in May when they will be assessed again. The young people explained how the work towards the Eco Flag has been incorporated into lessons across the school and has involved help from various agencies including, RSPB, Fife Ranger Service and Scottish Native Woods Organisation.

The visit and the presentation was an introduction to a general report on the situation within Fife regarding Eco Schools and Fair Trade.

Councillor Douglas Chapman, Chair of the Education and Children's Services Committee, said: "Out of 186 educational establishments we now have 133 schools with some level of award from the Eco-Schools project and most working towards an award, with five high schools already achieving Green Flag status and two primary schools with permanent Eco status.

"This is a marvellous achievement and shows that Fife is taking huge steps towards our goal of becoming the leading green council while providing the perfect opportunity for fully integrating a Curriculum for Excellence.

"Pester power usually has negative connotations, but it's clear that it is young people who are driving the agenda by taking this issue very seriously, through encouraging their families to be more aware of their energy usage, how they re-cycle and by recognising their impact on the environment."

The Eco-Schools project embraces the principles of Fair Trade and the Education Service has played a significant role in helping Fife's bid to become a Fair Trade County.

Madras College has helped demonstrate what an Eco-Schools ethos is capable of doing for a school. "The councillors were left in no doubt about the positive impact the pupils have been making to the school. They were so impressed!" said a proud Mr Bennett.

The Eco-Committee are now turning their attentions to realising a state of the art large garden area at the back of the old janitors house (CPD building) in Kilrymont Road. "This is our most ambitious project yet" claims Finlay Williamson (S3). "We've designed it together with our teachers and Lee Aitchison, a landscape artist from Creating Eden in Cupar". The finished area will be wheelchair accessible, contain large raised beds, a decked area and a large pond with a rock garden beside it. "We'll also have a huge shed to keep all our tools in" added said Corinna Rengger (S3) enthusiastically.

Mr Bennett and Mr Fox, who took the group to Glenrothes for the meeting, were extremely pleased with the pupils who represented the school brilliantly.

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# Debating

Last year we thought was our finest. Junior teams into the second round of the ESU competition, and our senior team winning the Debating Matters Regional Final to become Scottish winners and head to London for the National Final. They then won a place in the final of the highly prestigious Donald Dewar competition. This year, we have excelled ourselves.

At the time of writing this, our junior team, Emma Ruskuc and Esther Bowman fought well in the second round of the East of Scotland competition against some very strong competition. On Saturday 27th February two junior teams; Leo Gordon and Rory Malcolm, Geir Darge and Gemma Martindale-Malek, took part in the International Competition for Young Debaters held here in Madras. We also managed to make up three 'swing' teams at short notice to help competitors. The juniors have also been invited to a day of debating in Robert Gordon's in Aberdeen on Saturday 22nd May. They are also preparing for their Inter-House debate to be held at the beginning of next term.

Our seniors however are exceeding all expectations. On Friday 5th March, our team of Michael Weir, Miriam Martindale-Malek, Alice Minick, and Ellen Bowman defended and retained their title as the Scottish winners in Debating Matters. They will now head to London at the beginning of July to compete in the National Final at the Medical Research Council. In addition to this, Miriam won an individual prize for speaking and Mike got the prize for overall best speaker in the competition; a decision the judges made very clear was unanimous.

But it doesn't end there. On Tuesday 9th March, Mike and Miriam won their way into the final of the Law Society's Donald Dewar competition in Milngavie. The second year running we have managed this and therefore an enormous achievement. This final will take place on Thursday 17th June in the Scottish Parliament in Edinburgh when we hope to take a full complement of fellow debaters and supporters.

The 10th March saw us compete in the Edinburgh University Schools competition with two teams; Mike and Miriam and Katie O'Donnell and Lindsay Wright. They came a creditable 17th out of 44 teams.

Monday 15th March, in Livingstone, our 'unstoppable force' (quote from a judge) won their way into the semi-finals of the ESU Mace competition. This will be taking place on Saturday 24th April.

On Friday 19th March, a team of 10 competed in the European Youth Parliament debate at George Heriot's in Edinburgh. This included some 'novices' to debating who I am sure benefited and learned from the experience. Some who will hopefully carry the torch for debating into next year.

The senior Inter-House debate takes place on Wednesday 30th April at 6.30 pm. This is supported and judged by St Andrews Rotary and we are very grateful to them for their input and continued interest in this.

Mike and Miriam have had a phenomenal year, impressing other debaters and judges alike. As they move into the next stages, we can only keep our fingers crossed their talented hard work holds.

# Canadian Exchange

Scotland was glad to welcome back the Madras College pupils after they had completed their stay in Canada. Having already hosted their partners it was their turn to go and absorb Canada in every way possible. During their three month stay they managed to undertake a vast and varied programme including joining in big celebrations such as Halloween, a visit to Vancouver and an all important snowboarding trip. 
