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Maths Department

It has been another busy term for Madras' Maths department both for pupils within the classroom and for those taking part in National competitions.

MATHS AND MUSIC PROJECT

Mr Grewar's 3rd year Maths class was given an open-ended investigation – to research connections between Maths and Music. The results were a wonderful compliment to the pupils! The range of topics chosen was very impressive – a variety of projects are summarised below.

- A crotchet note made from card and its area calculated using composite shapes.
- The 'Mozart effect' suggesting a link with Mozart's music and improved childhood intelligence.
- A tune played with glass bottles using different volumes of liquid to achieve different notes.
- The average length of a music track.
- The ratio connecting piano keys.
- The relationship of areas between different types of drum.
- The mathematical connections with the Brunelleschi Dome in Florence.
- Several art and music compositions – very colourful and creative.

A special mention to Emma Ruskuc (S3) who composed a piece of music using scales involving prime numbers, composite numbers and digits of pi!!!! Congratulations again to all who contributed to an excellent project!

COMPETITIONS

One hundred and twenty S3 and S4 pupils took part in the The UK Intermediate Maths Challenge. This year a total of 39 certificates were gained. The haul included 6 Gold, 12 Silver, and 21 Bronze certificates. Special congratulations go to S4 pupils Johnny Watson, Paul Sinclair, Jacob Lamb and Andrei Ruskuc who have all gained entry to the 'Pink Kangaroo' competition (a European follow-up paper). Johnny achieved an outstanding 98 out of a possible 135 to win the 'Best in School Award'.

On 21st March we sent a team of 4 students (two S1 and two S2) to the Regional Final of the UKMT 2011 Team Maths Challenge at Informatics Centre, Edinburgh University. The team did extremely well finishing in the top ten. On 22nd March 2 groups, twenty S4 and twenty S5 pupils took part in Mathématiques sans frontières. The groups were given a number of problems to solve, one of which had to be answered in a foreign language. As we await the results, we hope that the teams can emulate the results of the last 12 years with at least one team finishing in the top 10 in Scotland and winning the competition on no less than 3 occasions.

Course Choice

In the singing section Katherine Skene (S6) was awarded 2nd place in the senior class, Leo Gordon (S4) was 3rd in the intermediate section and Freya Simpson (S2) was 3rd in the junior section. In the instrumental section Joanna Stark (S2) won the junior section and Megan Pettegree (S3) and Paul Sinclair (S4) were 2nd and 3rd respectively in the intermediate class.

Matthew McAnaw (S2) gained second prize in his age category for his enthusiastic rendition of "Address to A Haggis". Matthew has now been invited to represent Fife at the National Burns competition which will take place in Lockerbie in April.

French Exchange

This year sees the second exchange with Le College F Bloch Serazin in Poitiers. Our French friends will arrive for a week in June to be hosted by pupils in S3 and S4 and our party of 39 pupils and 4 staff will return on 21 September. This time we are flying to Paris and then hiring a French coach to cut down on the long journey. Our pupils will visit some Châteaux in the Loire, La Rochelle, including the aquarium, Poitiers itself, the school and 'Futuroscope', the cinematic theme park. We had a tremendous response and had great difficulty cutting the group back to 39 from the 65 who applied.

Baccalaureate

Following on last year's successful candidates for the Scottish Languages Baccalaureate where our Modern Languages candidates were 2 of only 19 in Scotland to be awarded the Scottish Languages Baccalaureate, we are happy to say that we have 4 Languages Baccalaureate candidates this year. We wish them well as they complete their Interdisciplinary Projects.

Euroscola

Individual distinctions include those of Katie O'Donnell and Alice Stewart. Both S6 girls were selected by interview to represent the school in the European Parliament in Strasbourg as part of the Euroscola programme, generously sponsored by the Rotary Club. James Primmer, Maud Woolf, Fiona Powrie, Corinna Renger, Rebecca Smith, Laura Wilson, Jilly Paterson and Nicole Petrie were chosen to represent their schools at this prestigious event which lasted the whole day. Involving experts from across the country, pupils participated in presentations, practical activities and various workshops to help give them ideas about what they could do in their own schools. The main theme of the day was 'Food and the Environment', a new topic about to be introduced into the Secondary Schools Eco-Schools programme.

Questions designed by the pupils were put to a panel of experts including representatives from SCIAF, the Marine Stewardship Council, Keep Scotland Beautiful and two MSPs; many of which caused some very lively and interesting debate among all the participants. "The pupils thought that it was very rewarding to be able to ask questions and discuss such important issues, especially in our Scottish Parliament" said Mrs Alice Pearson the Eco-Schools Co-ordinator at Waid Academy.

Pupils from Hamilton Grammar school dressed up and role-played various soil types as part of a workshop designed by the Macaulay Land Use Research Institute which had been designed to deepen the pupils' knowledge of improving Scottish soil. They provided models, videos and presentations on various scenarios of what might happen to Scotland's farming land in the near to distant future.

Mr Fox, the Eco-Schools Co-ordinator at Madras College added "It was a really great day! The pupils learned so much and it was a fantastic reward for all the good things both our Eco-Clubs have accomplished".

All year groups have fulfilled their programme of Saturday morning fixtures this term, winning a large majority of their matches.

Rugby

This year has proved to be a successful one on the rugby field with over 120 boys participating in an extensive Saturday morning fixture list. New fixtures versus Glenalmond and Strathallan proved to be very competitive and the matches versus old foes were equally rewarding.

Both the U16 and 1st XV won through to the last 16 of their Scottish Cup Championships (one of only two state schools to achieve this) with the highlights being a narrow 1st XV defeat to Dollar and the U16 performance of the season versus Hutchesons Grammar School in Glasgow. Captain Ciaran Hynd remarked that "the Cup was a season highlight with a tremendous win away to Hawick High School and top performances throughout the Cup".

In the Junior School playing numbers have been excellent and the S3's have proved to have the best win ratio, ably led by stand-out performances from Jon Price, James Picken, Jamie Gillan and Chris Charnley.

S2's have proved to be a very consistent XV with Shaw Palmer, David Hodge and Calum Stewart prominent throughout. Against experienced top private schools, all players impressed with their resilience and tenacity.

The most improved team is certainly the S1 XV. With challenging matches, the experience gained has given them a competitive streak and has developed an

ethos of genuine team work and confidence. Mattia Serrano, Joshua Cummings and Jack Michie in particular have developed into strong attacking threats for the opposition.

A real boost to the rugby at Madras College has been the inaugural season of girls' rugby. Twenty girls have trained and played matches at various cluster tournaments in Fife. The hope is that, next season, the team will be ready to enter the girls' Scottish Cup.

At the time of writing there are 3 tournaments to compete in with the S1 and Senior teams seeking to retain the trophies in the David Garland Glenrothes 10-a-side competition and the Perth 7's respectively. S3 will also represent the school against quality Edinburgh opposition in the Buckhaven Tournament.

As the season closes, there is a heartfelt thank you to all staff, who gave up their time voluntarily, as well as referees and parents who have all contributed to a successful and enjoyable school rugby programme.


