Euroscola 2012

In February a group of 26 pupils from all over Scotland spent five days in Strasbourg, the highlight of which was a day in The European Parliament in Strasbourg. Lyle McAdam (S6), selected as a candidate from Madras College, was sponsored by St Andrews’ Rotary Club. Mrs McCartney (Principal Teacher Curriculum Modern Languages) was also selected to be one of the four teachers from across Scotland who accompanied the group.

During the visit there were intensive workshops in cultural and linguistic aspects of the trip. These were conducted for the most part in French. The group also prepared for the visit to the European Parliament, where 17 nations were represented and took part in debates and a Euro-game. Lyle was a credit to his school and his sponsors. He asked a question in parliament and won the cultural and linguistic Strasbourg challenge with his group. The group also had time to visit some of the sights of the area, albeit in very cold temperatures. All agreed that this was a trip which enhanced their linguistic and social skills enormously.

Paris 2012

During the February holiday the Advanced Higher French class, accompanied by their teacher, Mrs McCartney, and joined by their other French teacher, Ms Drylie, spent four adventurous days in Paris, visiting tourist attractions which included the Eiffel Tower, the Sacré Coeur, the Musée d'Orsay, the Louvre and the Champs-Élysées. Pupils will experience German school and family life and will take part in a number of excursions. The dates of the visit coincide with the world famous "Kieler Woche", sailing event.

Recent Recitations

Tony Curtis and Kwame Dawes visited Madras on Friday, 16th March to recite their poetry to S2 and S5 students respectively.

Accompanied by a guitar, Tony Curtis, who is an Irish poet, entertained the S2 students with stories, some of which were rooted in his homeland of Ireland, which had inspired his poems. With a wonderful turn of phrase, his poems gave another perspective on subjects as diverse as the sight of a humming bird overseas and the vision of his friend's dead mother wheeling a suitcase at a train station!

Kwame Dawes performed to S5 students sharing his poems some of which were inspired by reggae music and rhythms. One of his most moving poems was inspired by the birth of his daughter in which he used imagery enshrining his love for her in a very moving way. Another reflected his love of Jamaica where he spent his childhood. And another satirised one of his teachers whilst still accepting their humanity and vulnerability. Yet another poem wove references from Shakespeare's 'Macbeth' in the line 'what are these so wild and withered in their attire' with a school boy phrase used as a refrain 'fat boy'!

When asked what attracted him to writing poetry, his answer revealed an early love of nursery rhymes, a desire to write poetry which was accessible and a way to share a word journey or a transformative experience through the power of language.

At the end of the performance, our students were keen to have their photographs taken with Kwame Dawes and asked for his autograph too.

Inspiring Enterprise Conference

Thirty pupils from S5/6 Higher and Intermediate 2 Business Management attended a 2-day conference in February, designed to inspire our budding entrepreneurs, future leaders and managers. Apart from enhancing presentational skills and business knowledge, the course encouraged teamwork and promoted self-confidence in our Business students.

A programme of seminars and workshops were delivered by representatives from a range of business environments.

This year's programme provided our senior Business Education pupils with an opportunity to be involved in problem solving activities in relation to design production and development; role playing within team building exercises; financial planning; marketing and human resource management.

Of Mice and Men

This term a number of pupils, ranging from S3 to S6, visited the Lyceum Theatre in Edinburgh to see a production of Steinbeck's novel "Of Mice and Men". The story, set in Soledad, California, during the Great Depression of the 1930s is one which is often studied by senior pupils. The play tackles such themes as racism, loneliness and broken dreams but above all of friendship.

Some of the performances were excellent, William Ash, (also known as Mr Mead from the television show Waterloo Road!) as George, gave a moving portrayal of friendship and loyalty. Madras favourite, Liam Brennan was a convincing "Slim": sympathetic and authoritative. He also made a guest appearance on the bus just after the show! Rugby

It has been a busy term of Cup Rugby for the Madras Senior teams as both U18s and U16s have been progressing far in the National Bowl Competitions.
