Rector's Message

As in previous years the term began with the school's self-evaluation of our 2017 SQA exam results analysis and our South Street Guidance teams meeting with pupils to organise course changes and exam "remark" applications to the SQA.

With regard to our SQA exam results I am once again very pleased to report on an excellent set of results. In all 7 key traditional measures the school recorded an increase, the only school in Fife to do so. Not only this, but some of the attainment was quite outstanding (for example in S5 at 3+ Highers and 5+ Highers the pupils achieved a record 45.5% and 27.1% attainment - at first sitting). It is also a pleasure to report that for the third year running, Madras is placed in the Sunday Times list of top performing schools in Scotland, within which the school's performance in S6 at Advanced Higher placed us in 17th position.

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Christmas Trade Fair



Once again all S2 pupils have been working in teams to create, run and manage a small business enterprise. The Business and Enterprise department teamed up with Home Economics to deliver the 'Build and Bake a Business' project, the culmination of which was the annual Christmas Trade Fair, held during the Christmas Concert on 14th December. All pupils have been learning about the importance of creating high quality products and an effective brand in order to achieve high sales and beat the competition!

The awards for best profit and best brand were hotly contested and the winners are: Best Brand – Twistmas (2X7); Best Profit – Rudolph's Rocky Road (2X4).

Well done to all S2 pupils who made the project such a great success. All profits will again be donated to MND Scotland. Thanks also to Gillian and Brett from Rocca Deli in St Andrews who conducted some expert judging of the trade stands.



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Throughout the term we have focussed on a main priority of delivering “secure” learning to all pupils. Part of our improvement agenda to do this has involved reviewing our courses in the Broad General Education (BGE) to try to introduce extended topic material (linking to our National 4 and National 5 courses in Senior Phase) and to ensure time is created in these courses for meaningful practice. In the upper school this priority has involved the simple strategy of ensuring all pupils who take a study class have work set from their subject teachers and that their work in their study class is closely monitored for “secure” engagement.

The day-to-day activities across the school have continued to support our rich array of extended educational experiences, such as trips and excursions, sport and musical events, toy drive and other charity events - as well as Top of the Bench and Mathematical Challenge.

In November, the fourth year pupils sat their A/B tests for a range of subjects as part of their introduction to the rigours of the SQA exam process (in May) and to help pupils, parents and school staff monitor (and support) their progress. I am pleased to report that although many pupils felt the pressure of these tests, they did very well and have shown a better understanding of the need for preparation and resilience.

We are now at the end of term and are busy with all the activities which occur at this time of year. We are very pleased with the start to the session and I am very grateful to all our staff for the continued hard work they do to support the education and for the extra experiences they offer to the pupils.

I hope you have a happy and engaging festive break and I wish you all a Merry Christmas and prosperous New Year.

NATIONAL MATHS WEEK

- The Maths department celebrated the inaugural year of Scottish Maths week in September. This event will run annually to support positive thinking around mathematics across the nation.
- Our pupils were able to participate in a number of great activities running throughout the week, some in conjunction with the University of St Andrews.
- Within the school pupils participated in the Sumdog challenge.

- S1 and S2 pupils were given the opportunity to compete in the “Maths wi Nae Borders” competition, a Scottish version of the maths competition *Mathematiques sans Frontieres*.

- S3 pupils had the pleasure of listening to our special guest lecturer Dr Charles Paxton, a statistician from the University of St Andrews mathematics department. He spoke to pupils about his research around Statistics and Sea Monsters.

- Our advanced higher pupils were lucky enough to visit the University of St Andrews Maths building to see a display of special Mathematics writings that were being exhibited for a short time during the week.

- A small group of higher and advanced higher pupils attended The Copson Lecture, run by the University of St Andrews, with invited guest speaker Dr Vicky Neale from Oxford talking about the magic of prime numbers.

S4, S5 and S6 pupils studying German attended a screening of ‘Goodbye Berlin’ at the DCA. We believe this to be the only screening of the film in the UK outside London. The film was well received by the pupils and we hope it will encourage them to go on to read the novel ‘Tschick’ by Wolfgang Herrndorf on which the film is based.

Ten S5 Modern Languages pupils visited the School of Modern Languages at the University of St Andrews networking event on Wednesday 22 November. They were able to put questions about language learning, university life and living abroad to current Modern Languages students there. They also had the opportunity to meet with staff and undergraduates, to learn more about courses in Arabic, French, German, Italian, Persian, Russian and Spanish and to share experiences with other pupils from across Scotland.
