### **Rector's Message**

Dear Parent/ Carer,

As we approach the Christmas break and look back on the first two terms of this session, it is clear there has been a great deal achieved and for us all to be proud of. In addition to my regular update, you'll also be able to read about a wide range of activities and pupil achievements from across the school – so please do read on!

A key activity at the beginning of the session has been to review our SQA results from 2022. The teaching staff have spent significant time scrutinising individual, class and cohort performances in order to learn as much as possible. I'm delighted to be able to report that results from pupils completing assessments and sitting exams has been very strong indeed and is reflective of the hard work put in by pupils, families and school staff. These results are even more pleasing given that it was the return to traditional exams after a three year break.

There are many highlights but I have picked just a few. These include improvements in the number of pupils in S4 achieving key qualifications at levels 3, 4 and 5. These qualifications are critically important in enabling pupils to access new courses inschool or in a post-school destination. For us, this meant that almost 85% of S4 pupils achieved 5 or more qualifications at level 4 and over 62% of that same group achieved 5 or more qualifications at level 5, both greater than our virtual comparator values and significantly higher than the Fife average. Senior school results at level 6 and 7 (Higher and Advanced Higher) were also very strong, with almost 35% of S5 pupils achieving 5 or more Highers in one sitting, with that figure rising to almost 72% of pupils gaining 5 or more Highers by the end of S6. By S6, nearly 50% of pupils achieved at least one Advanced Higher, with many more going on to achieve three Advanced Highers. Importantly, these figures at Higher and Advanced Higher exceed both pre-pandemic levels and virtual comparator values and support our continuing trend of improvement in attainment for young people over time.



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You'll be aware that for this session, we implemented our new guidance structure for pupils to ensure that, as far as possible, pupils, siblings and families can be supported by the same guidance teacher from S1 to S6. In almost all cases, pupils are now taught in their personal and social development classes by their own guidance teacher, providing a weekly opportunity to meet and work together. As a result, I would expect this to further strengthen the relationships between school and home and improve the quality of pastoral support available to all.

Welcoming parents into our new school last session was difficult and I am pleased that we've been able to remedy this and host several events so far this session covering P7 transition, junior and senior curriculum evenings. As I write to you, final rehearsals are taking place for the Christmas Concert and an opportunity for you to listen to the fantastic range of musical talent from across S1-6. The 17<sup>th</sup> of January heralds the return of our Careers Fair and with it, another opportunity to connect with us and find out more about the world of work from a wide range of local employers and education institutions. More information on the Careers Fair afternoon and parent evening will follow early in the new year.

In a similar way, school excursions and trips are back on the agenda following relaxation of Covid-19 mitigations. These trips add a great deal to the life and work of the school and I'm grateful for the support of staff who give freely of their time and energy to make these happen. This includes many of the seasonal events that take place over the school year. Christmas Ceilidhs have been running over this last week of term and all pupils have been invited to put their ceilidh dancing skills to the test. The awarding of prizes in each event has kept the standard of dancing high! In January 2023, we'll see the return of the Burns Night, hosted for the first time in our new school and a great leadership opportunity for our senior pupils who will organise the content for the evening.

In November and December, our S4 pupils were hard at work completing a range of assessments, many of these taking place in the formal setting of the assembly hall. The marking, feedback to pupils and parents evening has been completed, leaving all of term 3 available for further teaching, consolidation and improvement. While the initial data from assessments looks promising, there's always more to be done and we will continue to look at what further supports we can offer to ensure that all pupils meet their potential.

Please remember that Study Support will continue to be available to all S4-6 pupils across faculties and has been running throughout terms 1 and 2. Study Support provides an excellent opportunity for further advice and practice so please take some time to talk through what sessions could be suitable. The study support programme is highlighted on the weekly bulletin and can be found by clicking <u>here</u>.

Our S5/6 assessments are up next and will pupils will complete their Prelim Assessments at the end of January. The S5/6 Prelim Timetable is available and can be accessed pre-Christmas by clicking <u>here</u>. A separate letter will be issued shortly, detailing arrangements for the Prelim diet. Individual assessment arrangements will also follow at the same time. Planning for next session has started and course choice for all pupils in S1, S3, S4 and S5 will take place next term. To support this, the guidance team will be working closely with all pupils to go through coursing advice. Course choice information will be available to parents for all stages, including clear information on learner pathways and progression routes through subject areas.

A New Year provides a great opportunity to make a strong start and reflect on standards and expectations in our school. With that in mind, I'd like to ask for your support with school uniform and helping to ensure that all young people return to school after the Christmas break 'dressed for work' and clearly identifiable as a Madras College pupil. I fully appreciate the current financial climate and there are a few areas of support with regards school uniform. Click <u>here</u> and scroll to the bottom of the page to see how we can help.

I have also asked that teachers take the first couple of weeks in January to remind all pupils about our agreed school values, classroom expectations and the different ways that pupils can access additional support, if required. Year group assemblies will focus on these themes as well.

Finally, before you move on to look at the wide range of activities and pupil achievements from across our school, I'd like to thank you for your continued support and wish you a merry Christmas and all the very best for the New Year.


English classes, some of us spent time thinking about books that we'd loved



#### **Religious and Moral Education**

So far this year we have been covering a wide range of topics across different year groups, with lots of stimulating class discussion.




