Rector's Message

Dear Parent/Carer,

As we digest the events of the summer concert and look forward to the senior awards evening it's hard to believe the summer break is almost upon us. Session 2023/2024 has whizzed through and after the summer break we'll be ready to go for session 2024/2025.

Reading through the submissions from faculties for this newsletter really highlights the range and number of events taking place across our school- in and out of the classroom. I'd like to thank all of the staff involved for their hard work and commitment over the session to these activities. I'd also encourage all pupils to take a close look and take the chance to get involved in all that is on offer!

SQA exams and results

As you'll be aware, the 2024 SQA exam diet concluded at the end of May and all of the pupils coursework and projects have now been submitted. This year, course modifications implemented in 2020 following CV-19 were removed, reinstating the complete qualification for the first time in four years. This year has seen a tremendous effort from staff and pupils and we all keenly await the issue of results on Tuesday 6th August.

I'm very pleased to share a very positive piece of feedback from our invigilator team debrief on the conduct of all pupils during the SQA exam diet. All of the invigilator team reported very positively on the behaviour and attitude of our pupils - both those sitting exams and also who were attending classes as normal but who are moving around the school whilst exams are ongoing.

To be compared so favourably to the university students many of our invigilators also support is high praise indeed and a sign of the very high standard of conduct displayed our pupils.

Pupils sitting exams can still sign up for MySQA to receive exam results by text message and email. In the event of any queries following the issue of results, the school office will be able to collate queries or requests for support. As in previous years, the guidance team will be able to support with appointments for pupils on the afternoon of the 19th and 20th August, immediately prior to the start of the new session.


You can appeal directly to SQA or ask us at Madras to do this for you. The service will open on Results Day, Tuesday 6 August at 9 am

Priority Appeals

Deadline—Tuesday 13th August at 11.59pm for priority appeals. This is for those who are dependent on an appeal for entry to course. Please contact us here at Madras regarding this on results day, 6th August. Your appeal can only be prioritised if you have a conditional place at university or college or in training or employment that depends on your grade. We will need to know the name of your university / college and a contact person and email address in order to process a priority appeal.

All other appeals

The deadline date for all other appeals is Tuesday 27th August at 11.59pm



What is the Appeals Service?

If you appeal your grade, a senior appointee will carry out a marking review of your SQA-marked assessments.

It is not a re-mark. It is a marking review that checks that:

- All parts of your SQA-assessments have been marked
- The marking is in line with national standards
- The marks given for each answer have been totalled correctly; and
- The correct result has been entered on our system
- Please note that after being reviewed, your result could stay the same, go up or go down

All the best with your results on the day and remember we will be here in school if you need us.

Mini London Marathon





This year, as part of their athletics block in PE, the whole of S1 and the junior DAS class were given the opportunity to take part in the Mini London Marathon. The event challenged the young people to complete 2.6 miles, walking, jogging or running, between 15th April and 10th May. Our S1s achieved this by undertaking a 1.3-mile course over two Wednesday PE lessons.

In April, **Mrs Kennedy** from the English department completed the full marathon in London, so she volunteered to take part with the S1 classes, running 1.3 miles with the X block on 30th April, and with the Y block on 8th May. The S1's really enjoyed having Mrs Kennedy run with them, particularly those who raced to beat her across the line.

We were extremely proud of all the pupils and the effort they put in to take part. Everyone really pushed themselves to do their best, with the fastest three boys and the fastest three girls awarded medals for their efforts: Congratulations to Harriet Reid, Fearne Jarrett, Evie Hodgson, Rory Edie and Ruaridh Thomson. Particular congratulations go to Harry Robinson as our fastest finisher with an incredible 1.3-mile time of 6m 45sec.



Overall, 190 pupils were awarded their certificates for undertaking the challenge. We hope this will be an event we can participate in for years to come, and that we have perhaps even inspire some of them to undertake the full 26.2 miles one day.

This was the first time Madras College have taken part in this exciting event and we were, in fact, the only school in Fife to do so!







British Physics Olympiad

In March, National 5 and Higher Physics pupils were given the opportunity to sit the British Physics Olympiad papers for their respective levels.

Three of our S4 pupils attempted the intermediate paper. **Rodrigo Braunecker-Sicilia** and **Brodie Waterston** achieved a Silver award plus **Oisin Buckley-Zapf** achieved a Bronze award.

Ten S5 pupils attempted the senior paper with **Stuart Monks** achieving Silver, **Poppy Thomas**, **Xander Gray**, **Daniel Armstrong** and **Isla Munro** all achieving Bronze 1 with **Nazar Krasnobryzhev**, **Lucas Thomson**, **Luca Hartman**, **Florian Wahl** and

Callum O'Riordan being awarded Bronze 2.

Well done to all who took part—especially the learners who achieved Madras College's first ever Silver awards.

Hopefully we can progress to Golds next year!



RME and RMPS News



RME Core Classes

This year we have explored questions about belief and how our beliefs matter as well as units on Buddhism and creation stories and explanations for our origins.


In S2 we have looked at the topic of racism, introduced our new unit on Christianity and also covered a unit on Islam, helping give pupils across S2 an understanding of the world's two biggest religions. In S3 we have been looking at ethics and how we make moral decisions, as well as doing a unit on the topic of gender.

Along the way we have had some great class discussions and seen pupils engage with developing their own thoughts and ideas.

S4 meanwhile came in 6-week blocks and explored the moral arguments for and against abortion. In the new school year we will be using our time with S4 to help them complete the Belief and Values element of their Scottish Studies Award, supporting them as they choose their own moral issue to explore.

New Member of Staff

We have also just recently heard that we will be getting assigned a probationer teacher to join our department. **Ms Dineen** will be splitting her time between RME and Modern Studies and will be teaching some of our core classes for the coming year



RMPS SQA Level Classes

An exciting development this year is that we are now running separate classes for National 5 with Mr Webster and Higher/Advanced Higher with Mrs Matheson. This is due to an increase in numbers choosing to study the subject and will give us more opportunity to teach specific to the level. Our National 5 class will be studying units on Origins, Christianity and Morality and Conflict, whilst our Highers/Advanced Highers will be studying Existence of God, Buddhism and Medical Ethics.

RMPS is a subject that develops a wide range of higher order thinking skills through analysis and evaluation of different viewpoints on a wide range of issues and is a great subject to have studied for going into a wide range of careers.

Duke of Edinburgh Award

After struggling to run for a couple of years, this year we successfully ran a bronze expedition for three walking groups of pupils (21 participating in total). In training, the pupils learned about campcraft and navigation. They then put in a huge amount of effort to successfully walk the 30km, during the brief glimpse of summer we had at the end of May!

While the heat did make it more tiring, our group were motivated by the wonderful coastal views and even a

couple of sightings of dolphins in the Firth of Forth. Being able to cook dinner on the beach with their friends was also a highlight.

Burns Competition







After a well attended and entertaining recital competition at school, four pupil went on to represent Madras at the Fife Schools Burns Festival. **Robert Hutchison** won first place in S1/2 Verse section and two of our seniors, **Jan Tero** and **Thomas Robertson** were first and second respectively in the S5/6 competition.

All three boys then competed at the National Festival in Gourock in March and, although they did not achieve a top place, were commended for their performances.

Maths Challenges 2024



A very successful year for our pupils in the many national Maths challenges they have the opportunity to participate in.

United Kingdom Mathematics Trust Challenges

This year we had in excess of 220 young people competing in the United Kingdom Mathematics Trust Challenges across the Junior (S1-S2), Intermediate (S3-S4) and Senior (S5-S6) papers. The challenges encourage mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using mathematical techniques to solve problems. They are designed to make students think, most are accessible to the majority of young people who participate, yet still challenge those with more experience. It was a very successful year with our young people achieving 70 Bronze awards, 30 Silver awards and 10 Gold awards across the three levels. A special mention goes to the young people who qualified for the Kangaroo papers which are the follow-on round to each of the challenges. The Kangaroo papers are by invite only with several thousand young people across the United Kingdom being invited at each level. The qualifiers were Daniel Armstrong, Stuart Monks, Ash Simmons (Senior Kangaroo qualifiers), Edwin Peart, Yuvraj Singh, Brodie Waterston (Intermediate Kangaroo qualifiers), Andrew Lu and William Monks (Junior Kangaroo qualifiers). Stuart Monks and William Monks both performed exceedingly well in each achieving a merit in the Kangaroo paper. Well done to everybody that participated.

The Scottish Mathematical Challenge

The Scottish Mathematical Challenge is a problem-solving competition for individual pupils in Scottish secondary schools and upper primary schools. It has been running since 1976 under the aegis of the Scottish Mathematical Council. The aim is to promote mathematics as a source of interest and pleasurable achievement. Each year there are two rounds of problems for Secondary schools. 22 young people competed in the Scottish Mathematical Challenge with 17 of them receiving an award. There were 8 golds; Sofia Benssassi and Brodie Waterston (S4), Platon Nikolaev and Edwin Peart (S3), lan Cotnoir (S2) Grace Lin, Samuel Lovett and Ethan McDougall-Bagnall (S1). All award winners were invited to the

award ceremony at Stirling University where they enjoyed a




lecture on "Using Mathematics to Model Biology; From Fibonacci to the R Number" before receiving their certificates and coveted Scottish Maths Challenge mugs.



Mathématiques sans Frontières

Mathématiques sans Frontières is an annual international mathematics competition for senior schoolchildren, centrally run by the Académie de Strasbourg since 1989. This interclass competition involves a number of mathematical puzzles where one of the puzzles is posed, and must be answered, in a foreign language. Each class works as a team to tackle the puzzles in the allotted time.

This year two teams from Madras entered with both teams receiving a certificate in recognition of a commendable submission. Well done to all involved.

Scottish Enterprising Maths Challenge

Two teams participated in the Scottish Enterprising Maths Challenge. An event where each team comprises of two S3 and two S4 pupils. The two teams travelled to Bell Baxter High School in September to participate in the Fife heat and performed very well. The team comprising of Rodrigo Braunecker-Sicilia (S4), Oisin Buckley-Zapf (S4), Robbie Spence (S3) and Platon Nikolaev (S3) placing third and the team comprising of Akito Close (S3), Andrei Morrison (S3), Fraser Scott-Hermiston (S4) and Brodie Waterston (S4) finishing fifth in the overall competition. A very good performance against the most talented young mathematicians from across the region.

The strong performance in the Fife heat meant that Rodrigo, Oisin, Robbie and Platon qualified for the National final held at Glasgow Science Centre. Another strong performance resulted in the team gaining a place inside the top twenty, a fantastic achievement in a competition against the strongest young mathematicians from across Scotland. The pupils also


had the opportunity to discover the many wonderful interactive displays and exhibits at the Glasgow Science Centre as part of the day.

Madras DYW Round Up



This academic year, pupils have been able to engage with Developing the Young Workforce Activities in many different ways. From work experience placements to our massively popular Careers Fair, there has been lots going on. Here is a snapshot of just some of the highlights:

Wildflower Biodiversity





Advanced Higher Biology students have been carrying out the annual Wildflower Biodiversity survey in the school grounds. This was first carried out in August 2021 and it has been completed annually ever since, each June. Our surveying methods have been improving - using a specialised phone app for identification. We are really just trying to identify everything and anything growing in four different survey areas, excluding the trees.

This year we can see a huge increase in the number of different species in each of the four areas we look at (compared to last year):

67% increase at the back of the school 63% increase at the rear of the cycle shelter area 86% in the Tree Trail plot and a whopping 96% increase in the number of different species

around the pond area.

While our methodology is not perfect, this clearly shows a quickly increasing trend for this year, and generally, over previous years...great news for our environment and the species that live in it.
